Disability is caused by impairments to various subsystems of the body - these can be broadly sorted into the following categories. Physical disability. Main article: Physical disability. Any impairment which limits the physical function of limbs or fine or gross motor ability is a physical disability. Other physical disabilities include impairments which limit other facets of daily living, such as severe sleep apnea. Civil Service (Disability) Retirement; Federal Employees' Retirement; Federal Employees' Compensation; State or local government disability insurance benefits; or. Disability benefits from the military (This includes military retirement pensions based on disability but not Veterans' Administration (VA) benefits.) What documents do I need to provide? We may ask you to provide documents to show that you are eligible, such as Disability is part of being human. Almost everyone will temporarily or permanently experience disability at some point in their life. People with disability experience poorer health outcomes, have less access to education and work opportunities, and are more likely to live in poverty than those without a disability. Very often people with disability do not receive the healthcare services they need. Evidence shows that half of people with disability cannot afford healthcare. Definition of disability including types of disabilities and defines the meaning of the various models of disability. Disabilities can affect people in different ways, even when one person has the same type of disability as another person.
