The breadth of anthropological studies is both its strength and its weakness. For example, in the United States, all people are expected to wear clothes in public and to respect the private property of others. A man in a city does not take the car closest to hand nor the best; from among hundreds in the parking lot, he takes the one that is his personal property. It is not always easy to distinguish between patterned and unpatterned behavior, because cultures are constantly changing.
