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Gifted Readers: Literature Review. Gifted Readers are Different. Some gifted children, called "globally gifted," score high on all parts of IQ tests. Winner (1996) studied these children and found they do not follow the learning patterns typical of average children. Their book selections included nonfiction titles—even atlases and encyclopedias. While Winner (1996) describes children with language gifts as voracious readers, the literature indicates that their teachers and peers are not.
