



## The Next Superpower?: The Rise of Europe and Its Challenge to the United States

In reality, China is not rising but as Aaron Friedberg states, "it is returning to the position of regional preeminence that it once held." Indeed, China dominated that region for centuries. However, before China can become a legitimate superpower, it must meet its internal and external challenges and make some fundamental political changes. China's nine percent economic growth rate since 1990 has enabled it to expand its sphere of influence and gain ground not only in Asia but also in Africa and South America. This influence will probably continue to grow in the future. As a European leader once remarked, Europe should be a superpower, not a superstate. Faced with an increasingly powerful and authoritarian China, global heating, the challenge of AI, not to mention an aggressive Russia, chaotic Middle East and Trumpian United States, this argument is more compelling than ever. In a world of giants, you need to be a giant yourself. But is Europe up to the job? The answer is not a simple yes or no. And it has no place for European states that are either not, not yet or, in the singular case of Britain, no longer members of the European Union. In case you hadn't clicked already, the European leader who coined the "superpower, not a superstate" formula was a British prime minister, Tony Blair, speaking in Warsaw in 2000. Its geography is enviable: the United States is really the only major power that can host a two-ocean navy, with its sizable Atlantic and Pacific coastlines enabling it to project power. The United States has a younger population than Japan or Europe, and China's population is aging faster than America's. China is the most complex. It faces enormous challenges as well as enormous opportunities. It has a large population and its economy is still growing at quite a rapid rate.

The United States served as the primary architect of a system of norms and rules across global economics, health, and security in the aftermath of World War II. It is now a disrupter. Whatever the result of the U.S. presidential election on November 3, 2020, some trends are becoming clearer. As Beijing continues to develop, it will pose an even greater challenge to the United States and the global governance system. Yet the Trump administration has ceded the playing field to China by abdicating global leadership and neglecting to work with like-minded countries around the world, all while sowing division at home. The United States, however, can still bring its many allies closer together to oppose its adversaries: China, Russia, and Iran. The United States will either stop the practice of 'humanitarian interventions' and the cold war-ish support of armed groups and coups around the world, or they will crumble economically because the dollar can't support congress and the federal reserve simply printing more money whenever they need it to support the war machine, which by now is present in the form of bases, advisors or otherwise in nearly every country on the globe. If China were to become a worldwide superpower, this again brings complications to the world in my opinion, it opens the chance that China and the US disagree on vital topics and more importantly it again means that the world will have two sides to choose. Remembering that while China has embraced capitalism and investment, it is still a communist state. The next decade saw the United States' own sprint from military also-ran to global superpower, with a nuclear Soviet Union close on its heels. Today, few seriously anticipate another world war, or even another cold war, but many observers argue that these past experiences reveal just how quickly countries can become dangerous once they try to extract military capabilities from their economies. After that lies the challenge of transforming all this latent power into the full range of systems needed for global power projection and learning how to use them.
