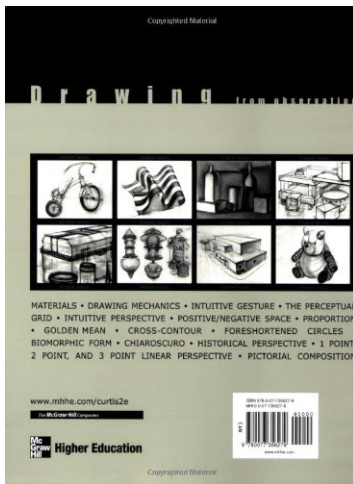

This book contains over two hundred drawings from Miami students. Â When it comes to applying tone to your drawing, as with everything else, look at the object. Observe where the light and dark areas are and copy what you see. In almost all cases, your drawing should have a full range of tone, from black, through a multitude of greys (or coloured mid-tones) through to white. Some students "having learnt how to blend tone smoothly from dark to light" develop the unfortunate habit of randomly shading all surfaces from dark to light.

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
